Hebron Housing Services Celebrates 40 Years!

2022 marks the 40th anniversary of Hebron Housing Services! With great pride, we carry on the mission of our founder Bernadine "Bernie" Juno.

Four decades ago, Bernie quit her job as a dental hygienist at St. Joe's Dental Clinic to make a difference in the lives of so many people she saw with nowhere to go. She started Hebron House to help get people off the streets and on a path to improving their lives. Since Bernie had never worked in a non-profit, she turned to churches for help and guidance. She worked without pay for eight years until the board insisted she takes a salary.

Bernie grew Hebron House to be the largest nonprofit provider of services to the men, women, and children struggling with homelessness in Waukesha County. Today her mission continues.

Siena House Gets a Facelift

Rosemary Becker was a staple at Siena House our short-term emergency shelter for single men for many years. She prepared meals, packaged hygiene kits, helped with laundry, and often just sat and spoke with the guests struggling with homelessness. Rosemary gave of her time as well as annual donations to HHS. In early 2020, she made a significant donation that served as the lead gift in renovating the house where she served. That gift led to additional funding from Waukesha County Community Development Block Grant, the Wisconsin Housing and Economic Development Authority, the Stackner Family Foundation, KPH Construction, and anonymous private donors.

In November, we cut the ribbon on Siena House without Rosemary, who passed away in 2020. A hand-carved and painted sign commemorating "Rosemary's Kitchen" was unveiled and hung in the kitchen to honor her memory.

Top-to-bottom renovations included the following:

- » Complete kitchen and dining area renovation to expand the prep, serving, and storage spaces
- » New energy-efficient windows
- » New flooring, lighting fixtures, and fresh paint throughout Second-floor bathroom expansion to include three shower stalls, three sinks, and two toilets
- » Removal of closets to increase bedroom sizes for guest bunks
- » ADA-approved first floor bathroom

Formerly a residential home, Siena House has been transformed to offer dorm-style accommodations and facilities for single adult men on a short-term basis. Guests receive a warm bed, hot meals, and access to services that provide a pathway to stable housing.

By meeting, we can eliminate duplications of efforts, provide more focused attention on our projects, and target the most urgent needs for that quarter. We are still inviting new representatives to join Hebron's Heroes, and each quarter we may have different groups at the table.

We kicked off this effort for the first time in February. Thank you to RiverGlen Church, Carroll University, Unity Lutheran, St. Charles Hartland, Christ the Servant Church, and Elmbrook Church, who joined the Hebron Heroes team. We are excited about the traction we've already created!
